1. George by Alex Gino—When people look at George, they think they see a boy. But she knows she's not a boy. She knows she's a girl. George thinks she'll have to keep this a secret forever. Then her teacher announces that their class play is going to be Charlotte's Web. George really, really, RE-ALLY wants to play Charlotte. But the teacher says she can't even try out for the part . . . because she's a boy. With the help of her best friend, Kelly, George comes up with a plan. Not just so she can be Charlotte -- but so everyone can know who she is, once and for all.

2. To Night Owl From Dogfish by Meg Wolitzer and Holly Goldberg Sloan—Bett Devlin and Avery Bloom don't know each other until Bett finds out that their dads are dating and makes contact with Avery via her too-publicly-available school email address to tell her. Worse, the dads are planning to send both girls to the same STEM and Arts summer camp while they go on a holiday of a lifetime to China. Both girls take exception to their dads' new relationship and decide they definitely won't become friends, but, over several weeks emailing each other, even when at camp, they build a relationship. Told entirely in emails and letters, this sensitive, often funny book examines what it means to be a family, and what happens when families change. Strong and vivid characterisation makes us feel we really know Bett, Avery, Grandma Betty and the parents, and relate to their decisions and feelings.

3. Gracefully Grayson by Ami Polonsky—A powerful novel about identity, self-esteem, acceptance and one student's journey to self-discovery. Grayson Sender has been holding onto a secret for what seems like forever: 'he' is a girl on the inside, stuck in the wrong gender's body. The weight of this secret is crushing, but sharing it would mean facing ridicule, scorn, rejection or worse. Despite the risks, Grayson's true self itches to break free. Will new strength from an unexpected friendship and a caring teacher's wisdom be enough to help Grayson step into the spotlight she was born to inhabit? Debut author Ami Polonsky's moving, beautifully-written novel about identity, self-esteem and friendship shines with the strength of a young person's spirit and the enduring power of acceptance.

4. Nothing Ever Happens Here by Sarah Hagger-Holt—This is Littlehaven. Nothing ever happens here. Until the spotlight hits my family." Izzy's family is under the spotlight when her dad comes out as Danielle, a trans woman. Izzy is terrified her family will be torn apart. Will she lose her dad? Will her parents break up? And what will people at school say? Izzy's always been shy, but now all eyes are on her. Can she face her fears, find her voice and stand up for what's right?

5. What is Gender? How Does It Define Us? And Other Big Questions by Juno Dawson— What's the difference between sex and gender? What does it mean to be defined by your gender? Are there only two genders? This informative book helps kids to explore these questions and many more.
